
The first topic to consider is the suggestion that we get together again in 2000! If that becomes a realistic goal, and we hope it is, there are many things to consider, and plans to put in motion.

We received a letter from a member of a 38TMW medical unit who lamented the fact he had not been invited to attend the first reunion. It appears we have another case of missed communications! In reality, he would have been most welcome, as were all others who directly or indirectly supported the tactical missile missions around the world.

I can cite a personal example of how important and appreciated these folks were.

We were in the throes of an extended Tactical Evaluation or ORI when I developed a severe case of strep throat. We had been working around the clock, and even the healthy were little more than zombies. Like the other crewmen, I was reluctant to go on sick call, because I knew everyone was needed at the missile site. Eventually I became so ill I had to see a doctor. We had been given a few hours off to attend to personal things, so I stopped to see Dr. Golden at the Hahn clinic. After examining me, and administering the expected shot, he told me to have a seat in the waiting room . He said he would locate some additional medication, but wanted to see me again before I left.

I was asleep the moment I hit the chair, and the next thing I knew, I awoke to an empty waiting room and darkness outside. I was in a panic thinking I was AWOL.

I rushed to the pharmacists window to get my prescription, and there was Doc Golden. He told me to relax, and that he had called the squadron to inform them I would be held at the clinic awhile. He said he suspected I would go back to the missile site as soon as I got my medication, but he also suspected I would fall asleep once I sat down. and within a reasonable driving time for many. Two possible sites are Oklahoma City and Dallas-Fort Worth. Both are within a 12 hour drive for approximately half our members, and both areas are served by several airlines that cover our east and west coasts thoroughly. As this is being written, we are researching the areas for facilities that would be acceptable for our needs.

Thanks to all who have donated to our operating expense fund. As of 1 Oct 99, we have received \$690 in donations. A special thank you for a couple of very generous donations that far exceeded the suggested amounts. It was greatly appreciated.

and not repeat what was told me! Oh well, maybe the statute of limitations has run out...and then again....!


