## HISTORY OF THE TACTICAL MISSILE....PART 5

This is the fifth in a series of articles condensed from the twopart feature in the Spring and Summer issues of International Plastic Modelers Society/United States Branch, Ouarterly. The authors were our own Fred Horky and a Dr. Griffen T. Murphey. Each author submitted his own manuscript, but the magazine editor combined thme. Fred wants us to know that he does not agree with some of the statements in the combined story, but is sharing them "as is".

The Teracruzer truck was perhaps the most fascinating part of the entire Mace missile weapon system. Unique to the Mace missile program, it was built by the Four Wheel Drive Corporation of Clintonville, Wisconsin, a company well known for their specialist off-road industrial and emergency vehicles. The Teracruzer was never given a military standard M-series designation, being known throughout its career by its manufacturer's designation derived from, their "Military Model-Number 1" identification. The truck was built in limited quantity, only 189 being delivered to the USAF, with a further two similar vehicles sold to Standard-Vacuum Oil for oil exploration work in East Pakistan (now Bangladesh) and two more to Kennecott Mining in Utah, used to plow under mine tailings. The USAF vehicles were all delivered by mid-1959 at a unit cost of \$35,366.



FWD built their first Teracruzer prototype with a friction roller drive on each of the wheels, but all production vehicles had more conventional axle drive on all wheels. Technically classed a "cab over engine" flat bed truck, it was really closer to an "engine in cab" design because the huge engine box dominated so much of the cab space. The cab featured tandem seats on either side of the central engine box cover. The vehicle was 30 feet long, with an 18-foot clear flat bed length, while the height was 9-1/2 feet (reducible to 8'-5") and the width was 9 feet. The truck weighed a remarkably light 15,000 lbs., while being rated to carry 16,000 lbs.

An air transportability requirement in the specifications dictated extensive use of light alloys throughout the truck, as well as an aircraft-type air cooled engine. This requirement also dictated reducible height by means of a removable cab top. Despite the considerable cost this specification added to the cost of the truck, both in acquisition and total life-cycle maintenance and reliability considerations, the writers know of no instance where the airtransportable capability was ever used other than during initial compatibility tests.

All MM-1s had factory-installed mounts for antennas and provisions for tactical radio, although we never saw either actually installed, either in Stateside training or operations in Germany.

The air-cooled engine was a Continental eightcylinder, horizontally opposed engine which had many features similar to Packard PE200 aircraft engines, including dual spark plug magneto ignition. It could deliver 250 bhp at 2800 rpms. The specification called for a maximum speed of 15 mph, but the 250 bhp could easily push an empty truck (or loaded, for that matter) to a considerably higher speed!

The engine ran on 115/145 octane aviation gasoline which was stored in a 200 gallon square tank, originally mounted at the right rear of the cab as seen in some of the photos in this article. The truck's original exhaust pipe ended at the level of the cab bottom, but a modification installed a tall "18-wheeler'-type exhaust stack at the left rear cab corner. This change included a switch of the fuel tank and spare tire positions, putting the tank on the left.

After some fuel mix-up problems a local procedure prominently marked the fuel tank with bold 6-inch stenciled red lettering on a large white rectangle, indicating servicing to be with "115/145 AVGAS ONLY". This was an attempt to prevent problems which could be caused by servicing the truck with either the JP-4 jet fuel used in the missile, or the MOGAS (regular gasoline) intended for the conventional vehicles also used in the launch complexes. These included commercialtype Ford and Chevy pick-up trucks, "Step-Vans", and even Air Force-blue Volkswagen station wagons, pickups, and Opel trucks which were locally purchased vehicles in extensive use by US forces during the 1950s and early 1960s.

Oil and hydraulic fluid coolers were installed in the normal radiator position at the front of the cab. Early versions of the MM-1 had a louvered grill, but the insufficient cooling air flow of this design caused production trucks to use a wire mesh grill. In addition, an external air filter was added in front of the windshield.

The engine cooling air was drawn by a large enginedriven fan, which exhausted downwards in front of the front bogie. One interesting use of this airflow was evident when the truck was being used as a stationary powerplant alongside the missile during maintenance on those cold German winter nights. Unlucky crew members, whose duties required them to monitor equipment outside the test equipment van, could usually be found huddled in their parkas under the engine, where the blast of hot air from the engine kept the ground beneath the truck warm and dry even during the heaviest snowstorm.
